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

Please have in mind!!!



- Veterinary <u>professionals!</u>
- Consider biosecurity as a verb!
- The goal of the PB
 - ➤ Do not bring infection on holding!
 - >Do not take the infection from holding!
 - > Do not spread infection in holding!
- latrogenic transmission induced inadvertently by a physician or surgeon or by medical treatment or diagnostic procedures
- Think about how to reduce the risk!!!



Basic Principles



- Segregation, (physical separation)
- Cleaning, (mechanical or chemical removal of dirt)
- Disinfection, (deactivation or elimination of the causative agent)




Biosecurity before enter the farm



- Car parking
- Car preparation
- Staff preparation
- Equipment

Cleaning and disinfection





What is the necessary equipment!



- Plastic mat
- Buckets (3 ideally)
- Detergent (approved)
- Disinfectant (approved)
- Scrubbing brushes (2)
- Rubbish bags (including biohazard bags)
- Ziplock bags (for transporting phone or other equipment)
- Disinfectant wipes for face
- Boots
- Boot covers

- Disposable head cover
- Disposable biosecurity suit
- Waterproof over suit if required
- Face mask (optional)
- Protective goggles (optional)
- Examination gloves
- Tape
- Scissors to cut tape
- Sampling and recording equipment



PB in practice



Clean

Dirty

<u>Clean zone</u>: only clean equipment, double bags which are disinfected and samples Only the necessary equipment Dress regular clothes CLEANING/DISINFECTION S **Put PPE EGREGATION** Remove PPE disinfect clean Dirty zone: FMD VIRUS!!!

- Other PPE
- Waste bag
- Bucket with disinfectant
- Sampling kit
- Ziploc bag
- Forms
- Pen
- Phone

• DIRTY

- Waste bag
- Bucket with detergent
- Bucket with disinfectant
- Two bushes



CLEAN

- Wear
 - Suit
 - Double gloves
 - Boots
 - Boot covers
 - Heat covers
 - Goggles (optional)
 - Mask (optional)

• DIRTY



CLEAN

- Take
 - Spare cloves
 - Treatment (opt)
 - Drinking water (opt)
 - Camera (opt)

• DIRTY











- In a group have a team leader
- Designate the disaffection point
- Put the plastic mat
- Put all of the equipment on the mat
- Put the equipment for the dirty part on the dirty part
- Put the disposable suit
- Put the disposable gloves
- Ensure them with the tape
- Put the second pair of gloves
- Put the boots
- Put boot covers
- Put headcover
- Put mask





- Put the forms, phones and other equipment in Ziploc bag
- Take the sampling equipment with you
- Take other items you find necessary (treatment, food, water)
- Help others
- Change the gloves between activities





- Clean and disinfect all materials and equipment that you will take with you
- Ensure no organic mater remain on the cloths of boots
- Remove the second pair of gloves
- Remove the overcoat
- Remove the gloves
- Leave waste on the farm
- Remove the boots
- Once more disinfect the materials and equipment and put them in a double bag
- Use the detergent and disinfectant in accordance with the producer instructions

Do not!



- Disinfects without cleaning first (Half a job syndrome)
- Does everything correctly then takes out the cigarettes/lighter/phone, contaminates them and puts them back in the pocket (Marlborough Man syndrome)
- Cleans and disinfects boots perfectly but neglects overalls/waterproofs (Brown coat syndrome)
- No clinical FMD on the farm so why bother? (Ostrich syndrome)
- Too busy, in too much of a hurry doesn't have the time to clean & disinfect (VIP syndrome)
- Disinfection point too far away why not just jump the fence? (Lazy syndrome)
- One bucket of disinfectant will last forever- it does not need topping up or replacing regularly (Loaves and fishes syndrome)
